FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Ole Farmers, welcome to this our 30th Edition of Grapevine; thanks to our Editor War B, for ensuring we are appraised of relevant OFANA news. I use this opportunity to say Thank You and God Bless You All, for your support & contribution to OFANA, your Alumni Association, in 2019. Together we have done a tremendous job in affecting positive changes to the CASE Institution, Students and Faculty.

Thanks to the Executive Members for their hard work, on behalf of this organization, it is our collective dedication that keeps the OFANA engine running.

I congratulate our Region Vice Presidents and their planning teams for the continued dedication and steadfast support; below are only a few of our wonderful & noteworthy achievements last year:

January 24-26, 2019, members and the executive traveled to Jamaica, to celebrate the 109th Anniversary of the founding of our Alma Mater; at this forum we awarded 16 scholarships to deserving students at CASE. Since 2012, we have awarded 57 scholarships with a cumulative value of US \$53,400.00 (Jamaican \$6,527,000.00). To date two (2) of our scholarship recipients are valedictorians, others are currently pursuing advanced degrees, thanks to the contributions made by OFANA. We continue to mentor those that have reached out to us or that we have identified, that need the encouragement & support. Sincere thanks to Dr. Norma Dawkins and the Scholarship Committee for ensuring the highest level of vetting of the applications.

January 25, 2019, OFANA President presented Dr. Derrick Deslandes, CASE President, a check for US \$20,000.00 the final installment on the pledged US \$120, 000.00 to build the OFANA Plant Tissue Culture Lab (PTCL). The CASE Administration has promised that the PTCL will be ready for the grand opening early 2020. This PTCL will be a game changer; the facility is expected to greatly enhance CASE's ability to improve and upgrade the skill sets of both students and staff. It is anticipated that with this facility in place, along with the plant propagation center, the College will be able to establish itself as the premier center for reproduction of a wide range of planting material and fruit tree crops to service the Agricultural sector. Consequently, the successful implementation and execution of this scientific area of competency will contribute greatly to both national and regional agricultural endeavors.

February 24, 2019, our OFANA Canada Region, under the leadership of VP Audrey Spence, held a successful Inaugural Brunch in Toronto. Our Guest Speaker Hon. Lloyd Wilks, Jamaican Consul General to Ontario, applauded OFANA on the significant contribution to Jamaica's Agriculture sector. MPP Ms. Mitzie Hunter also in attendance, congratulated OFANA's contribution to Toronto and to Jamaica. I am so very proud of the wonderful Team Spirit and camaraderie shared by this group of Ole Farmers. Thank you, guys, for your infectious good spirit.

Next year's brunch is scheduled for March 1, 2020 in Scarborough, Toronto, do hope you will be in attendance, to experience this great event.

April 5, 2019 – OFANA contributed to The Red Springs Robotics Challenge held at The Immaculate Conception High School; this was the second staging of the competition with ten teams competing. This was one of OFANA's outreach efforts to assist our Jamaican students in the area of Technology, a much-needed component in the future agricultural arena.

We participated in the March 2019 UJAA / OFANA Mega Raffle, and our own Treasurer Renford 'Cherry' Williams was the consolation prize winner of an iPad. This new year 2020, UJAA/ OFANA Mega Raffle grand prize is a 2020 Lexus Sedan. Please do help us to sell these raffle tickets; all

He has also served as Animal Science Instructor and Research Technician for the University. With his experience and abilities in graphic design, video editing, and photography, Dr. JOHNSON plans to make the department the premiere marketing and communications unit of all 1890 institutions by blending agriculture and technology in unprecedented ways.

Dr. JOHNSON also plans to enhance communications and marketing of the College by creating a better process of communicating the College's activities to students, staff, stakeholders, alumni and the community. He will lead the unit with the support of his favorite quote, "It is better to be prepared for an opportunity and not have one, than to have an opportunity and not be prepared for it. Where others see challenges, I see opportunity."

This year we celebrate the 110th anniversary of the founding of the Government Farm School on January 25, 1910.

The weekend's highlights included:




The service of thanksgiving for his life and work was held at Falmouth United Church, Falmouth, Trelawny, on December 14, 2019

PUBLIC HEALTH ALERT

Initial Public Health Response and Interim Clinical Guidance for the 2019 **Novel Coronavirus Outbreak** — United States, December 31, 2019–February 4, 2020

Summary

What is already known about this topic?

In December 2019, an outbreak of acute respiratory illness caused by a novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) was detected in mainland China. Cases have been reported in 26 additional locations, including the United States.

What is added by this report?

Nine of the first 11 U.S. 2019-nCoV patients were exposed in Wuhan, China. CDC expects more U.S. cases.

What are the implications for public health practice?

CDC, multiple other federal agencies, state and local health departments, and other partners are implementing aggressive measures to substantially slow U.S. transmission of 2019-nCoV, including identification of U.S. cases and contacts and managing travelers arriving from mainland China to the United States. Interim guidance is available at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/index.html and will be updated as more information becomes available.

Just in case you missed it, Jamaica's Senior Ice Hockey Team was crowned 2019 LATAM Cup Champions on September 08, 2019 after a hardfought victory over defending champions Colombia in the final, creating history in a sport that is foreign to the tropics.

"For me, this says we can compete amongst the best of the associate members," Jamaica Olympic Ice Hockey Federation Director Don Anderson told the **Jamaica Observer** after returning home from the tournament. Associate members, he explained, are countries that do not have an ice rink.

"The kind of game we played told me that we are ready for the next stage where, if we can get an ice rink in Jamaica, I believe we can move forward to try to qualify for the Olympics," Anderson added.

Anderson, a veteran sports administrator, admitted that the tournament was more difficult than the scores suggest. He admitted that before the tournament started he didn't expect Jamaica to get any further than the first two days. However, with each game his confidence grew because the standard of play was very good for a young team taking on grown men. Anderson praised the coach, Cyril Bollers, and his assistant Darwin Murray for doing an excellent job despite the fact they had very little time to work with the team before the tournament.

Anderson, who has attended seven Olympic Games himself, said that the support received from Jamaicans in South Florida and elsewhere was phenomenal. Reminiscent of Usain Bolt's victories, the PA system blasted reggae music and people from other countries started cheering for Jamaica especially when a berth in the final beckoned.

"It was an awesomely inspiring experience. The spirit of the team was fantastic; the discipline was superb, the standard of play excellent. The players, who all live overseas but have Jamaican heritage, play in the college system and in different leagues. What we did well was to pull them together into a nice unit that understood each other," Anderson explained.
