### **FROM THE PRESIDENT**

#### **A case for greater OFANA involvement at CASE**

Good things happen when you make sure that good things happen.

On Saturday January 25th Balford Banton, Vice President, Georgia region and I participated in the 4th Annual Founders' Day celebrations at the College of Agriculture, Science & Education (CASE) in Passley Gardens, Jamaica. We were also there to present the OFANA annual scholarships. Although it was a good occasion, we were nonetheless disappointed that we only presented 2 scholarships to the 2013-2014 scholarship applicants.

I am reminded of the story of the three men on the construction site who were asked to describe their jobs. The first worker described his job as working for 8 hours for a paycheck while the second worker was very proud of his skills as the best stone crusher on the site. However, the third worker offered a much broader view of the description of his work. He was there to build a cathedral. He was the clock builder, not a time-teller. We have an opportunity to help the CASE students to be cathedral and clock builders by helping them to matriculate and apply for the OFANA scholarships.

This brings me back to the opening sentence of this column, which is to make good things happen. I believe that all members of OFANA and all Ole Farmers can assist in spreading the word in the

CASE community that OFANA scholarships are available to qualified students. Support the current administration in getting the word out to the students and encourage them to apply. The faculty, especially the Ole Farmers, has a similarly significant role in telling students about the scholarships. I was told that CASE has a population of around 1,000 students, 800 of which reside on campus. The OFANA Scholarship Committee should therefore be inundated with applicants so that they can make award decisions from a broader pool.

It was the great Canadian hockey player, Wayne Gretsky who once said: "You miss 100% of the shots you never take". Don't miss out of an opportunity of a scholarship to enable your education. In the end, and in a very competitive world, the best equalizer is an education.

## C.A.S.E. CORNER

### 4th ANNUAL FOUNDERS' DAY

The 104th anniversary of the founding of the Government Farm School was commemorated by the CASE Alumni Association with the staging of the 4th Annual Founders' Day celebrations, January 24 – 25, at the College, Passley Gardens, Portland. The celebration commenced on Friday, January 24 with the presentation of cutting-edge research and development papers on aspects of Agriculture, Science and Education at a "Research and Development Technology Symposium"

Activities continued on Saturday, January 25, with the cutting of 104th Anniversary Cake, recognition of the 2014 "Distinguished Ole Farmer of Excellence" Dr. Hon. Rev. Garnet Brown, O.J, C.D., J.P., presentation of donations to the College and the presentation of OFANA scholarship awards to deserving students. Due unfavorable weather, the sporting activities were curtailed.

Webster McPHERSON, JP President of the CASE Alumni Association had this to say: **"I hereby convey sincere and heartfelt gratitude and appreciation to all Ole Farmers who supported the activities of Founders' Day 2014 which was celebrated Friday, January 24 and Saturday, January 25, in**

**particular Ole Farmers Wendell CODNER and Balford BANTON of the Ole Farmers Association North America, Inc. (OFANA) who journeyed from the USA to fellowship with us as well as to donate two scholarships to deserving students at the College.”**

## **OUR FOUNDING FATHERS**

### **Part 1**

**Rt. Rev. Enos NUTTALL, Bishop of Jamaica 1880 – 1916; First Archbishop of the West Indies 1893-1916** came to Jamaica in 1862 as a missionary in the Methodist Church and was ordained a priest in the Anglican Church in 1866, was elected Bishop of Jamaica at a special synod held in July 1880. He was consecrated in St. Paul’s Cathedral, London, in October 1880.



He was 38 years old at the time of his consecration and went on to dominate the life of the Anglican Church for the next 36 years, serving as Bishop of Jamaica as well as Archbishop of the West Indies.

There was a rapid expansion in the number of churches founded under

his watch especially in the parishes of Kingston and St Andrew. Churches such as St. Jude’s, St. Matthew’s, St. Luke’s, St. Patrick’s and All Saints were all built during his tenure. His focus was, however, not entirely on the saving of souls for the after-life. He among several other church men of his day felt and advocated that religion and education were inextricably linked. Accordingly, under his leadership, the church pursued with much greater missionary zeal a programme of education among the black population which they had begun prior to the date of emancipation. Archbishop NUTTALL championed the cause for government to shoulder the cost of education as an essential part of duty to provide education for the masses, not as patronage, but as an entitlement for their status as citizens and taxpayers. This type of political activism resulted in the establishment of a Board of Education which enjoyed the cooperation and supervision by both the government and church in the operation of a system of education.

The Anglican Church started Cathedral High (which was later merged with Beckford and Smith High to become St. Jago High) St. Hugh’s High and St. Hilda’s High during the Nuttall era. In 1876 the church initiated efforts to establish a local Church of England Training College, which resulted in the founding of St. Peter’s College, on lands near Cross Roads in St. Andrew in 1893.

By 1892 Bishop NUTTALL founded an industrial school at the Hope Plantation in St. Andrew with a nucleus of 20 boys

transferred from the Shortwood Industrial School. This incidence marked the initial process for the founding and development of Farm School, as it was at that time the government decided to remove the Industrial Schools from under the supervision of the Police Department and place them under the Inspector of Schools.

At the 1897 synod of the Anglican Church Archbishop NUTTALL declared that education was the modern path to progress by all races. He stated that education must be wide-spread, efficient and practical as circumstances will permit, since the modern world of competition demand an intelligent and educated workforce which can also contribute to the maintenance of social stability. In his deliberations the colonial powers were exhorted to spend less on the police department and more on education as the control of crime was a major concern in the society.

In November 1899, a team chaired by the Archbishop of the West Indies, Reverend Enos NUTTALL, was appointed by the governor of Jamaica, Sir A.W. Hemming with the task to establish an Agricultural Department and an Experimental Station based on a resolution adopted by the Legislative Council May 30, 1899. The components of the Department of Agriculture to were to include; The Department of Public Gardens, Government Laboratory, Agricultural Society, Experimental and Teaching Stations.

It was agreed to have the Station located at Hope in close proximity to Hope Gardens, the Boy’s Industrial School and the proposed Government Laboratory. The

Experimental Station personnel were to be responsible to provide instruction in the agricultural sciences and arts to youths who plan to become planters, to be actually involved in manual agricultural labour, instructors in elementary schools as well as training secondary school boys to be in charge of estates. Such secondary boys to be exposed to subjects such as chemistry, plant and animal physiology, geology and instead of classical studies to be involved in the practice of animals and plants husbandry.

Archbishop NUTTALL died May 31, 1916 at the age of 74.

## FOR YOUR SAFETY

ATM Skimmers are devices that criminals place over or on ATM machines to steal your card information, including your pin number. While the tricks used by these thieves can be complicated,

there are a handful of simple methods to properly protect your financial information:

- Choose your ATMs wisely. Look for ones that are within bank perimeters, well lit and/or on busy streets. If possible, try to always use the same ATM, since it will be easier to identify abnormalities.
- Hide your pin! Even though you may be alone, that doesn't mean you are not being watched. Modern day skimmers now also hide little cameras to register you inputting your PIN. If you take the simple precaution of covering your hand while inputting your information, you'll help prevent the criminal from getting this information.
- Look for abnormalities. Most skimmers have to attach their skimming machine over the real ATM using simple adhesives since they often have to quickly remove the device. Check the machine to see if the input device wobbles or seems unattached. If it is, use another machine. Also look for out-of-place cameras and keypad overlays that can also capture your pin number.
- Report the abnormalities. If your card is not returned after the transaction or after hitting "cancel," immediately contact the financial institution that issued the card.

- Check your accounts regularly. To decrease the chances of cyber criminals running away with all your money, check your accounts regularly and immediately follow up on any suspicious activities.
